My Dearest Elizabeth Aug 21

Yours of the 9 came to hand yesterday and never have you written a letter to me that gave me reason to regret over it than the one I am about to answer may God bless and take care of you my own dear and true wife I am pleased that Marshall is better for I know how bad you would feel my dear to lose him I hope you will take good care of your health my dear for I felt so bad to hear that you are sick and do not enjoy yourself I guess your acts dear are all strait but I have not time at present to figure them up will do so the first opportunity and if I discover any mistake will inform you of it you said you hoped I would continue to love you my dear I will continue to love you as well as ever wife was loved yes dear unless you give me reason to feel otherwise I will continue to love you as long as this world revolves around on its own axis as long and lasting as eternity my dear I will love you my love will be for you unless you give some cause that will change my heart yes dear wife every days absence from you serves only to make my love stronger and stronger for you my own dear dear Elizabeth oh how thankful I am to god that he has given me one sweet being in this world that I can love and that love for you dear wife is my guardian angel that keeps me in the path of virtue and with the help of god shields me and saves me from all the disgraceful and awful temptations by which I am surrounded and you need have no fears my dear wife my marriage vows will be kept as sacred as the word of god with his divine assistance I shall never disgrace myself nor you by any thing that I may do while away from you by cowardice or shirking duty or any abominable indulgences have confidence in your husband dear and fear not for I know if you could but feel how I love you all fears would fly now dear we must feel thankful to god for all this for I have no strength nor power in me to resist all these things but what comes from god yes dear it is the divine influence of his holy spirit that guides me and it is prayer and earnest supplication to god that brings the spirit to resist and I believe the prayers of my dear and

loving wife at home ~~that~~ are being answered every day oh dear
there is power in pray so keep on my dear and don't think
that I ever go to bed at night before asking God for his
blessings to rest upon you to take care of you and the children to
keep you in the path of virtue and honour and to give you power
to resist the temptations of the wicked and that he would give
you a longing and thirsting after righteousness but I must stop
writing in this still hoping you will excuse me for dwelling so long
upon one point but when I begin to advise you or to tell you how
much I love you my whole sole soul is meaning so much more
than I can write and my heart yearns to clasp you to my ^{bosom} heart
that I could write for ever and then fail to put my feelings
in proper - my dear I know and imagine your feelings while
you was writing how you ~~feel~~ should feel if you dealings with
another man you said you should feel that our marriage contract
was broken and you never could look me in the face again
you cannot imagine how thankful I felt I stopped reading and
thanked god most earnestly that your ideas were so pure and good
and oh how I pondered when I thought and asked myself the
question what I should do if you should feel to vile temptation
I think it would be one of the most terrible things that could happen to
me and I should lose all controul of my feelings and commit some
act that would damn my soul in eternal perdition but
blessed be god dear I have no fears in god is my trust and
he is all powerfull and mighty to save if we only ask him
you say dear and I know that many a brave soldiers wife has
yielded to the vile tempter and become sunk in degradation and
sin I should never want to see home again if I was there ~~household~~
my dear you make me proud when telling me that there has
gone a good report of me to my sweet home no I am not proud
but thankful that this is the case and I feel encouraged
to go on and strive to do better still and oh may god help me
since I have left home I have always tried to do my duty as a
soldier and one who feared god the who has assisted me in all
that was good and if I ever return I mean to never give just
cause for any person to say anything to impure my character
I have never written to your Brother but would do so if I
had his address but I have not you send me the address of

your aunt in England but said nothing why you don't see
do you want me to write to her or have you heard from her
since I left I write to your mother which is dear to me
on account of my darling wife quiet often but get no answers in
return I am indeed very sorry dear wife that you lost your tooth you
must look like old scratch on account of it bad luck to the penknife
that done it anyhow I guess I will know yet dear wife if you
have only lost one tooth you were right in saying you believed I
should love you though you looked old yes dear I will love you
though you should lose all your teeth and eyes and become
bald headed you need not laugh my love nothing can
change but I think you must get the tooth replaced by
another before I get home so that you may look as much as
possibly as you did when I left and be very careful when you
eat frankies again if you had been eating soldiers crackers
I should not have been as much surprised as I was never
mind dear wife neither I am spared to come home or not gods will
be done meet me in heaven where parting will be no more
oh I am so glad that you are striving to live a christian and
will pray that god will assist you and you speak of the hardships
that Thomas had to pass through yes my Elizabeth after reading
all you can and having it described to you as well as possibly
you can then form no idea of the soldiers hardships I am
glad that stands it so well now my dear wife I have
answered your letter and made remarks upon it and I scarcely
know what to fill this sheet up with I wrote only a few
days ago to you how ever I went down to the living room
to draw clothing yesterday the room is in charge of an
old lady that looks very much like your mother she goes by
the name of mother in the Hospital a fine old lady
she is I got engaged in conversation and gave her my history
which you have boded me repeat so often of course I told her
how I became acquainted with you and how you were worked
me while taking after me I put all the flourishes as you
know I thought she would laugh untill she would hurt
herself to see me mentioning it of she then made me go and
get your picture and show her and as soon as she saw
it she said it was Mary Mannon the lady I told you of
